

Dear Parents/Guardians/Students,

The Minister for Education and Skills Joe McHugh TD has today (Wednesday 29 April 2020) announced revised arrangements for this year's Junior Cycle Examinations.

Under the revised arrangements and in light of the exceptional circumstances presented by the COVID-19 pandemic, the work and achievement of third year Junior Cycle students will be recognised with a state certificate from the Department of Education and Skills.

As soon as possible after the end of the current school year, students will receive a written school report on their learning achievements in each subject, short course and/or priority learning unit

"In this difficult time for students I have listened to the very strongly-held and wellarticulated views of students, parents and other stakeholders," Minister McHugh said.

"This decision has been made with the health and wellbeing of students, parents and teachers at the forefront of our thinking.

"It gives students and their families more clarity and certainty. It also gives schools freedom to decide how best to assess the progress of students following three years of hard work and learning."

The Minister explained that the certification will involve two elements:

A State Certificate of completion of Junior Cycle from the Department of
Education and Skills. Students should receive a State Certification that they have
completed three years of Junior Cycle education in a number of subjects/priority
learning units. This certification will be provided by the Department of Education and
Skills.

A School Report setting out the learning achievements of students in Junior

Cycle. Students should receive a written report on the broad range of learning that

they have achieved in each subject, at the end of Junior Cycle.

It is our expressed desire that, by implementing assessments for our 3rd year Junior Cycle

students before Friday, May 29th 2020, both parents and students will get a broader picture of

a student's progress and achievement in our school over the course of their junior cycle. Most

importantly, the focus on teacher-student feedback and professional collaboration between

teachers will enrich both the quality of students' learning and teachers' assessment of that

learning.

As this has only been announced by the Minister for Education this afternoon we will be

working with staff to formulate a plan around the School Report. As soon as we have

decisions on this we will outline clearly to you what is going to happen next regarding

assessment and reporting. In simple terms, whatever form of assessment and reporting we

determine to be appropriate it must be concluded by May 29th. No assessment will be

carried over into the 2020/21 academic year. In the mean time you teachers will continue to

keep you informed.
